WASRAG's Annual Report for the year 2016-17

Friends,

This year marks a significant milestone in WASRAG's progress. Early in February 2007 the Board of Directors of Rotary International approved the formation of WASRAG and the first Annual General Meeting was held that year in Salt Lake City, Utah. Ten years later we have much to be proud of – and exciting plans for the future!

In those early days Rotarian Action Groups had an uphill battle. It needed strong and persistent Rotarians to convince the Board of Rotary International that RAGs should be formed. The acceptance was quite tentative. There was concern that RAGs might negatively impact The Rotary Foundation – but the Foundation continued to flourish. As RI's concerns faded, RAGs increasingly became partners with the Foundation in serving humanity.

Our first six years were the "building years". Passionate and dedicated Rotarians like Ron Denham and Bob Wubbena developed a vision, built a management structure and recruited like-minded Rotarians to join them. As the relationship with RI thawed, we developed stronger relationships with RI and the Rotary Foundation. Excited by the opportunities they saw, some Rotary senior leaders joined WASRAG's administrative team, thus raising our profile and taking us into mainstream Rotary.

When the Future Vision Plan was implemented, The Rotary Foundation identified six Areas of Focus and appointed a Manager for the Water and Sanitation AOF. WASRAG became an important part of the support team for that role. Many of our members sit on Rotary committees and others have been called on for technical advice. Our support of our Area of Focus Manager is the model that other Areas of Focus aspire to. WASRAG continues to lead the way.

One tangible example of the close relationship with the Foundation is a recent decision of the Trustees to choose WASH in Schools (WinS) as the targeted challenge to be offered to all clubs worldwide once the current pilot is completed. Yet another opportunity to utilize the skills of our members and increase our involvement in the pilot projects in Kenya, Guatemala/ Honduras/Belize and India

In 2016 WASRAG adopted a revised Constitution and Bylaws which reduced the number of Board members and clearly separated the roles of the WASRAG Board and the Operations Team. The Board meets three times a year online, with a face-to-face meeting at the



International Convention. The nine-member Operations Team conducts the day-to-day activities of WASRAG. The relationship between the Board and the Operations Team is evolving into a highly effective management structure

Our future is exciting. We have drawn together the resources that we need to fulfil our mission:

“To provide information, support and encouragement to Rotarians, Rotary Clubs and districts and to take active roles in projects/programs to develop safe water and sanitation as a means of promoting health and alleviating hunger.”

Despite an excellent Newsletter and a large mailing list, not all clubs and districts know what WASRAG can offer. Many of the initiatives described in the Operations Team report are aimed at raising awareness of WASRAG’s resources. Our newly established Ambassador Program and Professional Services Team are just two of several strategies designed to address this concern.

In the next few pages we will summarize some of the many activities that are underway in the WASRAG firmament. There are many opportunities to get involved and be part of our team. We hope you will find WASRAG’s future as exciting as we do!

On behalf of myself and the other Board members, I’d like to thank each and every WASRAG member. Your support has been invaluable. Many of you will be mentioned later in this document. We couldn’t have done it without you.

- Guiding clubs and districts on the implications of sustainability to ensure that Rotary projects meet the requirements of the SDGs.
- Creating an interactive forum to discuss and recommend appropriate processes.

World Water Summit(s)

WWS8 in Seoul was a tough act to follow! But Co-Chairs PDGs Julia Phelps and Ron Denham, assisted by Summit Team members Marga Hewko, Isis Mejias, Peggy Pollen and Anna Shepherd have pulled out all the stops this year to present WWS9's "WASH and Women" on Friday June 9, 2017. This year's summit was cut to a half-day event to avoid conflict with the Presidential Peace Conference taking place that same afternoon. Instead, interested participants are invited to join a series of complimentary informal round-table discussions and workshops. All are aimed at giving WASRAG members and other Rotarians the tools they need to facilitate the very best WASH projects.

In a new departure for WASRAG, Rotarians will have the opportunity to register for World Water Summit 10 while they are in Atlanta. WWS-10 is scheduled for June 22nd, 2018 in Toronto, Canada. Registration will be available at WWS9 or at the WASRAG Booth (#2927) in the Atlanta House of Friendship.



WASRAG's Tenth Anniversary Celebration

A key role on WASRAG's Operations Team is Membership Satisfaction. The team realized that there is a significant need for someone who will address such areas as membership recognition, organizing social events, ensuring WASRAG is represented at Rotary functions and dealing with innovations within Rotary. This was especially critical this year as we celebrate WASRAG's Tenth Anniversary! We were very fortunate in identifying Chris Etienne to fulfill this role. Along with fellow Operations Team member Mary Beth Growney-Selene, Chris is managing our celebration at the Georgia Aquarium on June 10th. Plans are to honour some of the WASRAG members (and others) who have contributed so much to our success in our first ten years! BREW (Beers Rotarians Enjoy Worldwide)/WASRAG MOU

BREW and WASRAG have concluded a Memorandum of Understanding concerning areas of mutual interest. Both recognize the critical importance of clean water. BREW has stated as one of its goals a wish to provide more clean water by supporting WASRAG and donating a portion of the funds it raises to WASRAG-endorsed WASH projects. BREW also agrees to invite and encourage commercial brewers globally to support club projects endorsed by WASRAG.

As part of her role in Membership Satisfaction, Chris Etienne will act as liaison between the two groups, helping BREW to identify appropriate project WASRAG endorsed projects.

The WASRAG Fund

WASRAG is using \$5,000 in DAF (Donor Advised Funds) to fund the pilot of a new program targeted at assisting Rotary clubs to conduct improved WASH projects through the Rotary Foundation. WASRAG will review clubs' Global Grant applications before they are submitted to the Foundation and offer suggestions on how they could be improved. Once the suggestions are incorporated into the final application and taken into account in the project design, WASRAG will contribute \$500 towards the project. These funds will be donated directly to The Rotary Foundation and earmarked to the specific project once the project has been approved by TRF.

In the 2016-2017 year, WASRAG Operations Team fundraisers Mary Beth Growney-Selene and Ron Denham explored additional sources of funding to expand the program once the pilot is completed. Details of the fund and how to apply will be posted on the WASRAG website shortly. In the meantime anyone with questions should contact Operations Team Chair Nicholas Mancus.



Finances

No report on WASRAG's activities would be complete with a mention of the major role played by our Treasurer, Mike Colasurdo.
